Summary of Rulemaking Action:

The purpose of this regulation is to limit volatile organic compound emissions from consumer products. The Department of Environmental Management, Office of Air Resources is proposing to amend the regulation to clarify compliance dates, add a sell-through period, and ban the use of methylene chloride in consumer paint and coating removal products..

In accordance with R.I. Gen. Laws § 42-35-2.8, an oral hearing will be granted if requested by twenty-five (25) persons, by an agency or by an association having at least twenty-five (25) members. A request for an oral hearing must be made within thirty (30) days of this notice.

Regulatory Analysis Summary and Supporting Documentation:

There is no demonstrated need to revise these regulations. The clarification of dates in the rule is a technical correction only. A sell-through period was added to minimize the generation of unnecessary waste from manufacturers disposing of non-compliant products. The ban of methylene chloride in consumer paint and coating removal products is consistent with federal guidelines and is proposed to be added to the rule so that state and federal standards are the same.

The Office of Air Resources has determined that implementation of the amendments to Part 31 would not have a significant adverse economic impact on small businesses or cities and towns in the State.
