Regulatory Analysis Summary and Supporting Documentation:

The purpose of these Rules and Regulations is to establish recreational hunting seasons; to set the possession and bag limits; and to regulate the manner of hunting in order to efficiently manage the wildlife resources of Rhode Island. There are new season dates for hunting as well as grammatical changes, removal of redundant

lanuage, sections reworded, additional species and bag limits added for those species. Specific changes to sections below.

Page 6 - 9.7(E)(1)(b)(2) There was an eeror when the Town of New Shoreham submitted their dates for the hunting season on Block Island. This change is to correct the missed dates.

These Regualtions do not impose any new requirements on regulated antities including any small businesses or any city or town; therefore, there is no adverse economic impact. In the development of the proposed rule/amendment consideration was given to: (1) alternative approaches; (2) overlap or duplication with other statutory and regulatory provisions; and (3) significant economic impact on small business.
